








From 2019 to 2021, traffic fatalities in Washington increased by 23 percent.

Traffic Crash Trends






From 2019 to 2021, pedestrian and cyclist traffic fatalities in Washington increased by **37 percent**.

ASE – A Brief History



- Authorized by RCW in 2005
- Originally limited to school zones
- Currently used in 15 cities in Washington
- In 2022, law expanded use to additional locations




Examples of Success



90% Drivers who receive a ticket do not receive a second one


> **67%** Reduction in tickets issued since 2012



89% Drivers who receive a ticket do not receive a second one

47% Reduction in speeding vehicles

Camera Locations





School Speed Zones: 20 mph zones within 300 feet of a school



School Walk Areas: Designated walk routes of less than one mile



Park Speed Zones: Area within 300 feet of the border of a park



Hospital Speed Zones: Area within 300 feet of the border of a hospital



Camera Locations





Other Locations

- one additional camera for every 10,000 residents
- Requires equity analysis
- ♠ Allowed in locations:
 - where other speed reduction measures are not feasible or effective
 - with higher rates of collisions than city average
 - with restrictions and penalties on racing


Best Practices - Equity




Context: Is there a history of underinvestment in transportation infrastructure in low income/minority communities?

Location: Who is impacted by the chosen camera location?

Fines: What options are available for low-income violators?





Best Practices - Community





- Build an advisory team that includes the people involved in planning and operation of automated enforcement, as well as groups that will be impacted by it
- Seek input from the community, particularly from residents near proposed sites, people who frequently use the site, and other groups who may be impacted

Best Practices - Evaluation



- Analysis of vehicle speeds
- Crash statistics in ASE locations and jurisdiction-wide
- Data on citations issued
- A good program should see a decline in tickets issued as driver behaviors change



The Goal




Reduce high-risk driving behaviors that contribute to traffic crashes.
