THE IMPACT OF THE INFRASTRUCTURE AND INVESTMENT JOBS ACT (IIJA) - FUNDING

 Washington awarded additional funds from NHTSA as a result of the IIJA in 2022.

Fund	IIJA Increase
402 – Highway Safety Program	\$ 1,170,000
405b – Occupant Protection	\$187,000
405c – Traffic Records	\$250,000
405d – Impaired Driving	\$737,000
405d – Impaired Driving 24/7	\$22,000
405f – Motorcycle Safety	\$24,000
405h – Walker and Roller Safety	\$50,000
Total Increase	\$2,440,000

402 most flexible of the traffic safety funds 405 program specific funds with unique restrictions



THE IMPACT OF THE INFRASTRUCTURE AND INVESTMENT JOBS ACT (IIJA) - REGULATION

- Regulatory changes will take effect in Federal Fiscal Year 2024.
 - Transition from an annual highway safety plan to a triennial highway safety plan:
 - "The HSP must have:
 - A comprehensive, data-driven traffic safety program that results from meaningful public participation from affected communities;
 - Data-driven traffic safety enforcement programs; and
 - Data collection and analysis to ensure transparency, identify disparities in traffic enforcement, and inform traffic enforcement activities.
 - 164 Funding change eligible for impaired driving countermeasures, not just alcohol



PROGRAM PLAN REVIEW PROCESS

- Internal
 - Peer and management review of all program plans, January & February
- External
 - Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) Review March
 - Written feedback
 - Verbal feedback
 - TAC members brief their Commissioners
 - Individual commissioner briefings for Commissioners without a TAC representative
 - April WTSC meeting final approval



2023 HIGHLIGHTS - IMPAIRED DRIVING

- Local enforcement \$500K, increasing slightly
- WSP Impaired Driving Program support increasing
- Traffic resource prosecutor program remaining static
- Dedicated DUI enforcement in Spokane is concluded
- DUI Court support remaining static, one court may drop off self sustaining
- Expanding DUI-cannabis prevention campaign for young adults
- Piloting Electronic Home Monitoring at Clark County DUI Court, plus funding for indigent clients

2023 HIGHLIGHTS – WALKER & ROLLER SAFETY

- Continue 7 local projects from 2022
- Budgeting \$700,000 for additional local projects
- Devoting \$700,000 to a new Public Service Announcement (PSA) and media campaign targeting drivers following laws protecting walker and roller safety and consistent with the "Together We Get There" brand and approach.

2023 HIGHLIGHTS – TRAFFIC RECORDS

- Two projects concluded in 2022
 - AOC Law Table Clean Up
 - DOL State 2 State Data Clean Up
- Four new projects will start in 2023
 - CRAB GIS-Mo Training
 - DOL Data Catalog
 - DOL Feasibility study of a legal case management system
 - WSP SECTOR Collision Diagram Tool
- All projects are IT/Database focused.

2023 HIGHLIGHTS - COMMUNICATION

- Funds all of our ongoing communications work
- Increasing funding for all projects in this portfolio
- +\$950,000 for the "Together We Get There" campaign
- New State funding for a "Slow Down Move Over" campaign
- More funding for local Target Zero Managers (TZM) to use paid media in their communities

2023 HIGHLIGHTS – COMMUNITY TRAFFIC SERVICES

- 17 Target Zero Manager (TZM) Positions (7 federal, 10 state)
- TZM Communications Lead
- 1 Statewide Law Enforcement Liaison
- 21 Local Law Enforcement Liaisons
- WASPC Traffic Safety Support Grant
- Law enforcement training to help grow engagement with traffic safety
- Law enforcement led strategies for growing proactive traffic safety culture

Comm Traffic Serv	\$1,741,000	\$1,323,000	\$418,000



2023 HIGHLIGHTS – OCCUPANT PROTECTION

- Additional funding for the Child Protective Seat (CPS) program –
 maintenance of the CPS Technician Network
- Additional funding for "Click It Or Ticket" enforcement campaign
- Creation of a PSA for seatbelts using the "Together We Get There" approach and brand
- Continuing a pilot project focused on teen seat belt use in high priority counties.

2023 HIGHLIGHTS – DISTRACTED DRIVING

- Continuing the King County Distracted Driving Campaign
- Continuing statewide and local distracted driving enforcement
- Promotion of the Distracted Driving Employer Toolkit
- Campaign to promote proper use of Advanced Driving Assistance Systems (ADAS)

Program	FY2023	FFY2022	Difference
Distracted Driving	\$1,160,000	\$1,058,500	\$101,500



2023 HIGHLIGHTS – MOTORCYCLE SAFETY

- Increased funding for all strategies
 - Promotion of advanced training and endorsements for riders
 - Motorcycle enforcement local agency and WSP
 - Media campaigns converting and expanding existing campaigns to the "Together We Get There" brand and approach

Program	FY2023	FFY2022	Difference
Motorcycle Safety	\$900,000	\$439,543	\$460,457



2023 HIGHLIGHTS – RESEARCH AND DATA

- Funds ongoing research program software licenses that support reports, briefs, and dashboards plus some primary research
- Annual observation studies of seatbelt use, distracted driving
- Reinstating a child passenger safety belt observation study
- Continuing the statewide survey of driver knowledge and behaviors

Program	FY2023	FFY2022	Difference
Research	\$572,820	\$420,000	\$152,820



2023 HIGHLIGHTS – YOUNG DRIVER SAFETY

- Adding strategies and adding funding for all existing strategies
- Developing advanced driver-assistance systems (ADAS) education for driving instructors
- Teen target zero
- Teens in the driver seat school-based program + you in the driver seat app
 - High Schools
 - Colleges

Program	FY2023	FFY2022	Difference
Young Driver Safety	\$260,000	\$100,000	\$160,000



2023 HIGHLIGHTS – TRIBAL TRAFFIC SAFETY

- Funding for two tribal traffic safety coordinators only one in the Yakama nation currently
- Tribal traffic safety conference/peer exchange
- Discontinuing the grant to support tribal law enforcement agencies

Tribal Traffic Safety	\$240,000	\$272,873	-\$32,873
