If someone is impaired and wants to drive, take action

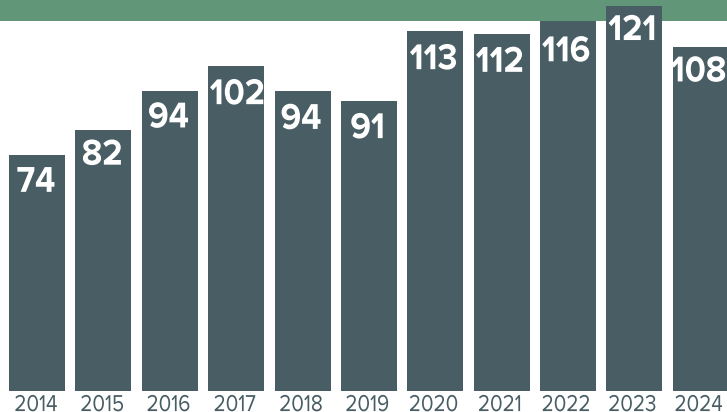
Did you know?

- ▶ THC-positive drivers also exhibited other high-risk behaviors, such as speeding (43%), not wearing a seat belt (30%), and being distracted (17%).
- ▶ More than one-third of drivers positive for THC were between the ages of 16 and 25.
- ▶ The majority (77%) of THC-positive drivers in fatal crashes were male.

Most Washington adults (97%) agree that it is dangerous to drive after consuming cannabis.

THC Positive Drivers Involved In Fatal Crashes



The effects of cannabis on driving:

- Impairs small motor skills
- Impairs judgement
- Slows reaction time

No matter what anyone tells you, no one drives better (or even the same) when high.

Make a plan before you go out:



Call a taxi or ridesharing service



Have a sober friend pick you up



Use public transportation



Plan ahead to stay over



Leave your car at home

Take Action: Most of us (80%) in a position to intervene take action to prevent impaired driving.
