This is a chock-full *SMAC Talk* with lots of great content for your reference and immediate action. In particular, a partner project of WSDOT is front and center: the pilot of using automated speed safety cameras to identify speeders on freeways is underway in Skagit and Spokane counties. WTSC, WSDOT, and WSP have been collaborating for months to craft the

courtesy notice of violation, including an educational component, determining the best pilot locations, and managing the public input via the WSDOT online open house.

I want to make you aware of a short-fused opportunity to share input regarding the use of **automated speed safety cameras** on **state highways**. As part of ongoing efforts to explore tools that may contribute to the reduction of serious injuries and fatalities, stakeholder feedback is being gathered on the potential role of this technology in enhancing traffic safety outcomes. Your perspective, especially as it relates to community impact, equity, or operational considerations, would be valuable in shaping future discussions in the Legislature and potentially, in local communities. Please use the link in the newsletter article to the WSDOT online open house to highlight your understanding of the preventive value of automated enforcement, especially as part of the larger statewide speed management plan. The open house ends very soon, so please don't delay!

On another note: for those of you with a graphic design department, would you consider developing a SMAC logo for our use to distinguish SMAC members from other Summit attendees? I'd love to see your ideas for how to make us stand out! I'm excited to see many of you at the Summit and thank you, in advance, for taking an active role in helping Summit attendees think more intentionally about speed management.

## Extra! Extra! House Bill 1596 Becomes Law

Governor Bob Ferguson signed <u>House Bill 1596</u> into law Monday, May 12, 2025, aiming to crack down on speeding drivers. (<u>source</u>) Also known as the BEAM Act, HB 1596 is named to honor four people who were killed in a high-speed crash in Renton in March 2024. (<u>source</u>) The law will go into effect on January 1, 2029.

# Know the Facts: More About HB 1596 and How Intelligent Speed Assistance (ISA) Technology Works

- ISA uses GPS technology and other sensors to prevent the vehicle from exceeding posted speed limits. (<u>source</u>) The devices can be installed on vehicles in a similar way to ignition interlock devices for people who are convicted of driving under the influence. (<u>source</u>)
- HB 1596 allows drivers who have been convicted of reckless driving or have accumulated three or more moving violations, to install anti-speeding technology, known as intelligent speed assistance (ISA), in lieu of license suspension. (source)
- Intelligent Speed Assistance is an example of an <u>"upstream" approach</u> to roadway safety.
- ISA has been found to lower speeding among drivers using the systems and has a 3-star effectiveness rating from NHTSA's <u>Countermeasures That Work</u>.

## **Summer's Near and Safety Messaging is Here!**

Now's a great time to highlight traffic safety partners you might not have thought of and possibly recognize how your own organization may have similar programs that provide resources and improve safety. 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"Round, 'round, get around, I get around": The US **Consumer Product Safety Commission** (CPSC) has traffic safety information for <u>micro mobility</u> like <u>e-bikes, e-scooters, and hoverboards</u>. You're welcome for inviting the Beach Boys to sing in your head!

"Splish, splash I was takin' a bath" (Name that artist!): The CPSC also has supporting Pool Safely resources that complements the **BoatUS** distracted boating prevention strategy and the **YMCA**'s a Phones Down, Eyes Up campaign that encourages focused attention when at the pool (which could be extrapolated to beaches and rivers!). **Boat-ed** offers tips for towing a boat safely and connects to the WA Boating Safety Course.

"We have joy, we have fun, we have seasons in the sun": **MADD** has <u>safety tips for every season!</u> The CPSC also offers helpful safety tips for <u>off-highway vehicles</u>.

"Get your motor runnin', head out on the highway": The **National Park Service** recognizes that not every road is the same—for some types of vehicles, some roads are very different! **CarParts.com** has unique traffic safety content that addresses special driving considerations like gravel roads, perfect for those urban dwellers, young drivers, or motorcycles!

So, if you're looking for traffic safety content, curious about who else cares about traffic safety in YOUR community or just like to hum along—there's something for everyone!

## **Speed Safety Cameras on the Highway**

Safety cameras are an important tool to address safety on our roadways, especially for those people who are actively working to improve our transportation system while standing in those roadways. Safety cameras are a critical resource to decrease speeds in these work zones, providing more reaction time for drivers to adjust to a roadway undergoing change and ideally decreasing impact speeds and forces for our workers when these crashes do occur. Especially as we enter the summer months (and construction season), many more work zones become active on roadways across the state. With law enforcement resources already stretched to cover the wide variety of safety needs on our roadways, safety cameras are a significant tool to extend their reach to improve safety on our roadways.

Demonstrating traffic safety leadership, and at the direction of the Legislature, in April WSDOT began <u>a pilot program</u> to track speeds using the "average speed method." This involves placing multiple cameras at each location and tracking the time it takes a vehicle to travel between two different measure points. The vehicle's average rate of speed between those two locations will be used to determine if the driver was speeding. This differs from other types of automated safety cameras which usually capture a 'point in time' snapshot of driver behavior.

SMAC members are encouraged to familiarize themselves with the project, consider the utility of the technology, and consider participating in the online open house to contribute to a robust public comment.
